SEXUAL & DATING VIOLENCE

Among High School Youth in Lakewood, Wheat Ridge & Edgewater

Overview

Sexual and dating violence can be physical, sexual or psychological harm, and it can happen to anyone. Youth who experience this type of violence often experience long-lasting effects that have an impact on their daily lives.

By the Numbers



1 in 14 high school students responded they have been physically forced to have sex when they did not want to.

What Youth Had to Say

At a young age we're not taught, like, this is not okay. Not even taught about it in sex-ed. We're taught how it works, not what consent is.

It's more common than physical abuse, but it's just not talked about as much. It's not validated like physical abuse. in the past year, **10%** responded that physical violence took place in their dating relationship.

A lot of high school relationships are not healthy. We're young, learning how to grow up, sometimes people get emotionally abused. It's pretty common.

What's Next
